Cat litter dos and don'ts



Cats do a great job of making a mess of their litter boxes, but they aren't that great at clean-up.

After your kitty covers up its business, the cat's part is done.

This leaves you with the dirty and often smelly job of making the litter box fresh and clean.

Try these helpful dos and don'ts to help keep both you and your BFF happy and healthy.

DO: Keep things clean

Cats like things to be clean. Make sure you remove solid waste daily and change the rest of the litter regularly, as well as give the litter tray a thorough clean.

DON'T: Keep changing things up

Do some research up front and you're more likely to have success right from the start. Take your time to select the right litter for you and your cat and find the perfect litter tray. Most cats prefer fine-grained litters, presumably because they have a softer feel. Once things are going well, stick with what is working and avoid changing things up as this can be unsettling for your cat.

DO: Find a perfect place for the litter tray

Cats like routine so selecting a perfect place for their litter tray and then keeping it there will make it easy for them to know where to go when they need to go. A quiet, dark place where they can have privacy, and a spot not close to their food source is ideal. Avoid placing litter boxes next to noisy or heat-radiating appliances. Some people prefer to provide their cats with a covered litter box. While covered boxes can increase privacy and decrease the amount of litter that flies from the box when your cat buries their business, there are some potential downsides. An "out of sight, out of mind" little box is easy to forget about, which may lead to a dirty box with odors trapped inside (which is even less likely to be appealing to your cat). Covered boxes can also be difficult for larger cats to turn around and position themselves in, and may lead to easier ambushes upon exit.

DO: Supply the right options

If you have more than one cat, you'll need more than one tray. A good rule of thumb is one tray per cat at a minimum. Make sure the litter trays are in different places and that your cat (or cats) can easily find and access them. Be careful in choosing the right size tray for your cat – check they have enough room to move and scratch and that they can easily climb inside it, regardless of whether it has sides or a cover. Litter also shouldn't be more than two inches deep.

DON'T: Scold your cat


Your cat isn't being spiteful if they have an accident or develop an aversion to using the tray and getting angry at them could potentially make them fearful of you and their litter trays. This is their way of telling you something is wrong, so take a step back and work out what the issue is.

DON'T: Ignore a problem

If your cat is having trouble using their litter tray or suddenly develops an aversion to it, the quicker you respond and work towards fixing it, the better the result will be. Eliminate common issues and don't ignore the problem as the longer it exists, the more challenging it will be to rectify.
